Volunteering, unemployment and the church

Being unemployed can be an anxious and distressing time. Volunteering can be a way of using skills, developing new ones and maintaining a pattern of work.

A recent publication by the Department of Work and Pensions states:

'Volunteering helps other people and can also help you in many ways. It can give you a better chance of getting paid work, by helping you to:

Learn new skills, practise the skills you have, become more confident, put some volunteering skills on your CV, pick up good ideas from other people, show employers you can keep regular hours and handle commitment meet people who can help you find paid work, have things to talk about in a job interview and get references.'

BY PROVIDING VOLUNTEERING OPPORTUNITIES YOUR CHURCH COULD SUPPORT SOMEONE AND GIVE THEM A BETTER CHANCE OF GETTING PAID WORK

There is work to be done in every church, church members may know of opportunities in other organisations or be able to help with CVs and other skills.

VOLUNTEERS WHO ARE UNEMPLOYED COULD ...

- ★ Join planning teams for church events e.g. pilgrimages, fetes, social events, church weekends.
- ★ Use their computer skills to develop church communications and help with administration.
- ☆ Teach church members new skills
- ★ Start or help run a church library or information resource
- ☆ Help maintain the church grounds
- ☆ Help maintain the church building
- Assist with toddler groups, youth groups or groups for the elderly (after appropriate checks)
- ★ Establish a taxi service to bring people to church activities
- ★ Be involved in fund-raising
- ★ Be part of the Welcome Team

In their Recruitment Guide Overview, 2009, they state:

People who are unemployed often have a huge amount to offer and can gain a great deal from volunteering. They need not put their benefits in jeopardy, although they should tell the Benefits Agency about their volunteering. Unemployed people can gain skills and experience from volunteering, and it can help them to remain in touch with the world of work. They are likely to want voluntary work that provides them with a chance to gain skills and experience that will be helpful in getting paid work.'
